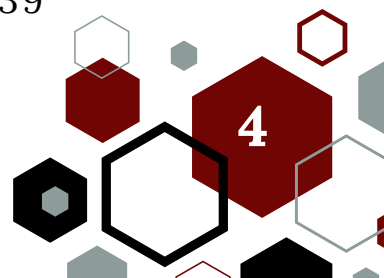

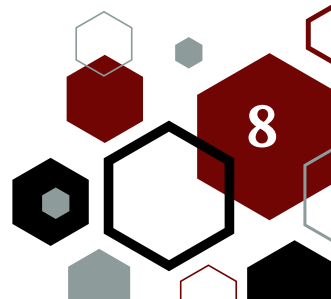

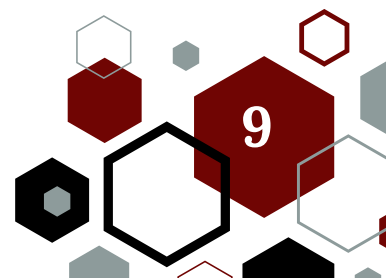

CHAIR REPORT

CONTINUED



The 2025 season marked a pivotal year of alignment and advancement for Dive Ontario as we moved into the second year of our 2024–2028 Strategic Plan. Guided by our three strategic platforms — Recruitment, Development & Retention (R), Improved Organizational Supports (I), and Provincial Presence (P) — the organization continued to strengthen its foundation for sustainable growth, athlete development, and community connection across Ontario.

Under Recruitment, Development & Retention, we advanced the alignment of athlete and coach pathways with Diving Plongeon Canada’s Long-Term Athlete Development (LTAD) framework. The refinement of technical standards, introduction of genderless Aspire categories, and the evolution of high-performance programming reflect our commitment to inclusion, equity, and evidence-informed excellence at every level of participation.

Within Improved Organizational Supports, we focused on governance renewal, accountability, and system sustainability. The continued implementation of the 2025–2028 High Performance Plan has embedding measurable outcomes across all areas of programming. At the same time, ongoing governance enhancements have reinforced transparency, operational stability, and clarity of roles — ensuring Dive Ontario remains a responsive, trusted leader within the provincial sport system.

Financially, the organization remains in a healthy position. The 2025 Financial Statements reflect responsible management and strategic reinvestment. This continued fiscal discipline ensures Dive Ontario can sustain programming and respond to future opportunities with confidence.

Our work in Provincial Presence and community development emphasized collaboration and capacity building. Targeted club supports, mentorship for coaches, and shared planning tools have helped foster stronger, more connected training environments across the province. Engagement through the Aquatics Council of Ontario and partnerships with municipalities has also strengthened advocacy for facility access and aquatic sport infrastructure. Together, these efforts are helping to ensure that diving in Ontario continues to grow as an inclusive, safe, and community-driven sport.

As we look ahead, Dive Ontario remains committed to advancing our strategic priorities through strong governance, collaborative partnerships, and continued investment in people and programs. Our progress this year reflects not only organizational alignment, but a shared commitment from our entire community — athletes, coaches, officials, volunteers, clubs, and partners — to growing the sport and fostering excellence across all levels of participation.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT

The 2024 season represented a pivotal year of progress for Dive Ontario as the organization continued to strengthen participation, system alignment, and organizational resilience across the province. Building on the foundation established in 2023, the organization advanced its work under the three strategic platforms – Recruitment, Development & Retention, Improved Organizational Supports, and Provincial Presence – achieving measurable results in athlete development, safety, advocacy, and partnership growth.

Collaboration with Diving Plongeon Canada (DPC), the Canadian Sport Institute Ontario (CSIO), and the Aquatic Sport Council of Ontario (ASCO) contributed to significant advances in both technical programming and strategic influence. Collectively, these efforts reflect Dive Ontario's leadership in driving athlete-centered, inclusive, and sustainable growth across the sport system.

Recruitment, Development & Retention

Dive Ontario made strong progress in broadening participation and strengthening pathways from grassroots to high-performance levels. The province saw an increase in Masters participation, with four Ontario Masters divers representing the province at the World Masters Championships – a milestone that highlights continued engagement and lifelong participation in the sport.

In collaboration with Diving Plongeon Canada, Dive Ontario supported the initial development of both the Ignite Program and a revamped Learn-to-Dive curriculum, both designed to modernize skill progression and engagement at the entry and foundational level. Dive Ontario also reestablished a Municipal Learn-to-Dive program in Durham, expanding community access and showcasing a replicable model for future municipal partnerships. Additionally, an increase in the number of Coaching Facilitators was achieved, ensuring that more coaches can deliver instructor-beginner courses province-wide.

Together, these accomplishments strengthen the athlete and coach development pipeline, enhance accessibility, and ensure that diving in Ontario continues to grow in both participation and technical quality.

Improved Organizational Supports

This platform focused on reinforcing the safety, wellness, and professional support structures that underpin sustainable performance. Dive Ontario developed and implemented a comprehensive Emergency Mental Health Action Plan (MHEAP) – a major step forward in embedding psychological safety and holistic well-being into the athlete and coach experience.

To complement this initiative, specialized Safe Sport and Mental Health Action Planning sessions were introduced for coaches, integrating wellness into the creation of Individual Performance Plans (IPPs) for both athletes and staff. These plans are now tied to measurable performance and wellness goals, encouraging consistency and accountability across the system.

Additionally, Dive Ontario successfully delivered programming in support of the Canada Games, including pre-Games training camps that emphasized preparedness, inclusion, and team culture. Collectively, these supports have strengthened the organization's foundation for safe, equitable, and effective athlete and coach development.

Provincial Presence

Dive Ontario's third strategic platform – Provincial Presence – achieved notable milestones in visibility, partnership, and advocacy. The successful hosting of the International Diving World Cup in Windsor elevated Ontario's global profile and showcased the province's ability to deliver high-caliber sporting events.

At the system level, the organization completed a four-year High Performance Plan (2025–2028) with revised Key Performance Indicators (KPIs), ensuring that Ontario's athlete development system is data-driven, transparent, and aligned with Diving Plongeon Canada's national standards.

In partnership with the Aquatic Sport Council of Ontario (ASCO), Dive Ontario co-authored a Call to Action for Aquatic Facility Development across the province, advocating for renewed investment in diving and aquatic infrastructure. This collaboration positioned Dive Ontario as a leader in cross-sport advocacy and long-term system planning.

These accomplishments have expanded Dive Ontario's influence and visibility, reinforcing the province's role as both a technical and strategic leader within Canada's diving community.

Looking ahead

Year 2 of Dive Ontario's 2024–2028 Strategic Plan demonstrated measurable progress in participation, safety, system alignment, and advocacy. Recruitment and development pathways have expanded, organizational supports have deepened, and Ontario's presence within the national and international diving landscape has grown stronger.

Looking ahead to 2025, Dive Ontario will continue building on this momentum — scaling community programs, embedding wellness and Safe Sport principles, and advancing its advocacy for facilities and high-performance excellence — ensuring a sustainable and thriving future for diving in Ontario.

TECHNICAL DIRECTOR REPORT



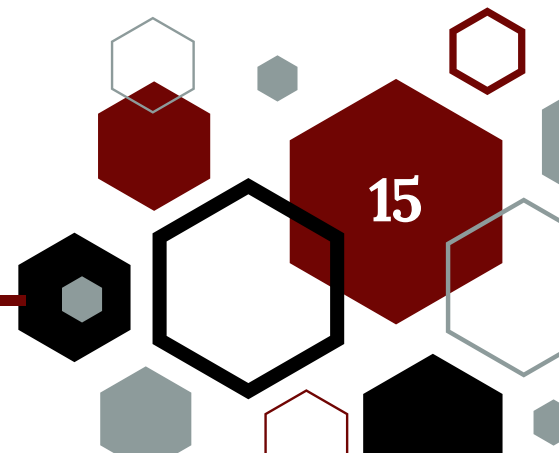
The 2025 season has been one of significant technical advancement, strengthened alignment, and outstanding athlete performance across all levels of the Ontario diving community. Guided by the principles of long-term athlete development and in close collaboration with Diving Plongeon Canada (DPC), Dive Ontario continued to build a strong, inclusive, and data-informed system that supports athletes and coaches from early development to international excellence.

Coach Development and Education

This season saw important progress in building technical capacity across the coaching community. Dive Ontario delivered two additional Instructor-Beginner courses, broadening the base of qualified coaches and enhancing access to quality instruction across Ontario clubs. Regular monthly coaching sessions provided sustained mentorship and shared learning opportunities, including a specialized Handstand Fundamentals workshop with Jorge, which focused on balance, posture, and technical control. These sessions have reinforced alignment in technical standards and strengthened collaboration among coaches across the province.

Strategic and Technical Progress

The completion of the 2025–2028 High Performance Plan marked a major strategic milestone, establishing measurable technical benchmarks, sport science integration, and aligned delivery across all levels of programming. This plan formalizes the collaboration between Dive Ontario, CSIO, OHPSI, and DPC, ensuring that Ontario athletes and coaches benefit from a unified, evidence-driven development pathway.

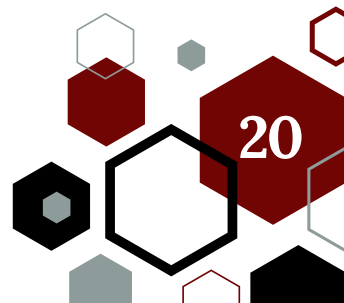

Independent Practitioner's Review Engagement Report

To the members of
Canadian Amateur Diving Association (Ontario) Inc.

We have reviewed the accompanying financial statements of Canadian Amateur Diving Association (Ontario) Inc. that comprise the statement of financial position as at August 31, 2025, and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations	Canadian Amateur Diving Association (Ontario) Inc. (the "association") is a not-for-profit corporation incorporated under the laws of Ontario. The association's principal activity is to run clinics for coaches and officials, run training camps for coaches and athletes, fund athletes, officials and coaches to meets and training sessions, and provide insurance and registration through the national body, Dive Canada. The corporation is exempt from income taxes under the Income Tax Act of Canada.
Basis of Accounting	The financial statements have been prepared using Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO).
Inventory	Inventory includes competition medals to be presented to athletes at future competition events and is measured at the lower of cost and current replacement cost. Cost is determined using the first-in first-out method.
Tangible Capital Assets	Tangible capital assets are not recorded on the statement of financial position. Expenditures for tangible capital assets in the year are recorded as expenses and disclosed in the statement of operations.
Revenue Recognition	The Association follows the deferral method of revenue recognition. Grants from Ontario Ministry of Heritage, Sport, Tourism and Culture are recognized in the period the grant specifies. Other restricted contributions are recorded as deferred revenue and recognized in the fiscal period the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recorded as revenue in the fiscal period received. Registration fees are recognized in the year in which the program takes place. Participant and entry fees are recognized in the year in which the specific event takes place. Material sales are recorded when the order is shipped.
Contributed Materials and Services	Contributed materials and services which would otherwise be paid for by the association are recorded at fair market value when determinable. Volunteers contribute a significant amount of time to the association's program and supporting services. Due to the difficulty of determining the fair value, contributed time is not recognized in the financial statements.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Use of Estimates The preparation of financial statements in accordance with ASNPO requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting periods. Actual results could differ from management's best estimates as additional information becomes available in the future.

Financial Instruments Arm's length financial instruments are recorded at fair value at initial recognition.

Related party financial instruments quoted in an active market or those with observable inputs significant to the determination of fair value or derivative contracts are recorded at fair value at initial recognition. All other related party financial instruments are recorded at cost at initial recognition.

In subsequent periods, equities traded in an active market and derivatives are reported at fair value, with any change in fair value reported in income. All other financial instruments are reported at cost or amortized cost less impairment. Transaction costs on the acquisition, sale or issue of financial instruments are expensed for those items measured at fair value and charged to the financial instrument for those measured at amortized cost.

Financial assets are tested for impairment when indicators of impairment exist. When a significant change in the expected timing or amount of the future cash flows of the financial asset is identified, the carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced and the amount of the write-down is recognized in net income. A previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement, provided it is not greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of the reversal had the impairment not been recognized previously, and the amount of the reversal is recognized in net income.

2. Cash

The association's bank accounts are held at one chartered bank. The bank accounts earn interest at a nominal rate. Included in cash is \$16,344 (2024 - \$15,991) held on deposit as security for the organization's credit card facility.

4. Internally Restricted Net Assets

The Board of Directors internally restricted a portion of the association's funds for the purpose of providing funding to host clubs and judges for National and Provincial competitions that occur once every four years. These internally restricted amounts are not available for other purposes without approval by the Board of Directors.

5. Economic Dependence

The association is dependent on annual grants from Ontario's Ministry of Heritage, Sport, Tourism and Culture Industries in order to finance its operations. Should these grants cease, the association would be unable to continue its operations.

6. Financial Instruments

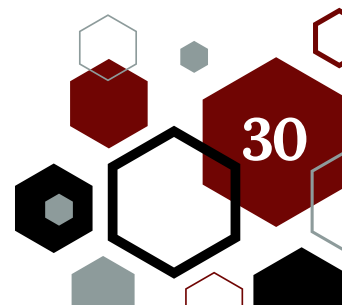
Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. Financial instruments which potentially subject the association to concentrations of credit risk consist of cash and accounts receivable. The association has deposited the cash with a reputable financial institution, from which management believes the risk of loss to be remote. The credit risk on accounts receivable arises from government agencies and members.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the association encounters difficulty in meeting its obligations associated with financial liabilities. Liquidity risk includes the risk that, as a result of operational liquidity requirements, the association will not have sufficient funds to settle a transaction on the due date; will be forced to sell financial assets at a value, which is less than what they are worth; or may be unable to settle or recover a financial asset. Liquidity risk arises from accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

There have not been any changes in the risks from the prior year.
